LORI HONER

Pedagogue and cellist Dr. Lori Honer enjoys a rich and varied career as a performer and educator, activities that she finds go perfectly hand-in-hand. As an educator, she has taught in public, private, and community music programs and at universities teaching cello, string literature, and pedagogy; supervising and mentoring student teachers; and coaching chamber music. Previous appointments include University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and Vincennes University; she served as the Coordinator of String Studies at Franklin College and the Director of Chamber Music at the Indianapolis Suzuki Academy. She is also the founder and director of the Indianapolis Cello School. She currently serves on the faculty of the School of Music at Butler University's Jordan College of the Arts. As a performer, Dr. Honer has performed throughout the United States and Europe. Currently, she performs throughout Indianapolis and the surrounding region. Her musical sensibilities are teasingly diverse and she feels equally comfortable in the recording studio with a band as she does in the concert hall playing a symphony. Dr. Honer earned a Bachelor of Music degree in cello performance from DePauw University, a Masters of Arts for Teachers degree from Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music, and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in cello performance and literature from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, where she was awarded a full scholarship. Other honors include being named the Indiana Chapter of the American String Teachers Association's "Studio Teacher of the Year" in 2022. She lives in Indianapolis with her husband, who is an animator and art fabricator, and their mischievous black cat, Oona.
